more than 7,000 islands.

Studio 26 – The studio of Shian Yuan Yachi and Dag Hol

Dag Hol and his wife and fellow artist Yachi share Studio 26 in their beautiful home. We are invited to visit this very interesting studio where they both work. They will both tell us about their work.



Dag Hol has been a well-known Norwegian artist since 1980, and has been somewhat controversial because of his classical romantic form. He has had exhibitions around the world, and many places in Norway, including Rådhusgalleriet in Oslo Town Hall. In 2016, his exhibition drew more than 3000 people to the opening, and around 22,000 people visited during the three-week showing.

Shian Yuan Yachi graduated from Taipei National University of the Arts. She has worked as an oriental calligraphic-ink painter for more than 10 years. Taiwan Art Bank, an institute sponsored by the National Taiwan Museum of Fine Arts, has acquired many of her works. Yachi has exhibited in Shanghai, Singapore, Hong Kong (at Christie's) and in many cities across East Asia. She has also worked as a contemporary art reporter in Taiwan. Now she works and lives in Oslo.

March Monthly Meeting

H. E. Anna Maria Siko on the history of Hungary

The Hungarian ambassador to Norway, H. E. Mrs Anna Maria Siko, gave a lecture on March 4 to some fifty-five Forum members. To understand the current situation in Hungary, we must look to the past. So, a brief survey of the Hungarian history is called for. The country has borders with seven countries.



The foundations of what was to become Hungary were laid in the ninth century by the great Árpád, who led Hungarian tribes westwards from the Don River. After settling in the Carpathian Basin, Árpád lead the conversion of his people from paganism to Christianity. On Christmas Day in 1000, Árpád's great grandson Stephen ascended to the throne with a crown sent from Rome by Pope Sylvester II. The kingdom and nation of Hungary was born. The Árpád dynasty ruled the country from the late 9th century until the beginning of the 14th century. The country was transformed from a confederation of

Hungarian tribes into a powerful state of east-central Europe.

The three-hundred-year reign of the House of Árpád saw the country become increasingly westward-oriented. The succeeding Capetian House of Anjou and Charles Robert I, King of Hungary and Croatia, brought expansion into Poland. There was a great flowering of art and architecture: The First Golden Age had begun. Under King Matthias – lauded for his fairness and justice – Hungary flourished. However, the king's death was followed by devastation under the Ottomans, who ruled from 1541 to 1699. The combined armies of Poland and the Holy Roman Empire managed to swing the balance of power in the region, and helped the Habsburgs oust the Turks, heralding a more stable time of reconstruction.

As the Habsburg Empire floundered, a revolt in 1848 resulted in the dual monarchy of *Austria the Empire and Hungary the Kingdom*. In 1867, there were two capitals and two parliaments. This 'age of dualism' sparked an economic, cultural and intellectual renaissance in Hungary. The Second Golden Age had begun.

At the turn of the 19th century, Budapest was by many considered the birthplace of the modern world. World War II wreaked havoc. The country was reduced to almost one third of its original size, and millions of ethnic Hungarians found

themselves living outside the new borders. The country was now under strong Soviet influence. A Hungarian uprising ended in the Russian invasion in 1956. The 'iron curtain' that divided Europe in two was reinforced. The uprising against the Stalinist Soviet regime led to 1500 Hungarian refugees seeking shelter in Norway.

Hungary declared its independence as a free republic in 1989, and has been a free country for almost three decades. Modern Hungary is experiencing a new renaissance. Hungary became a member of NATO in 1999 and joined the EU in 2004. In 2018, the GDP increased with 4.5%, inflation is around 5-6% and unemployment stands at 3-4%.

Mrs Siko was disappointed about the many negative articles on Hungary in Norwegian media. She has been working in Oslo since 2015, and has invited numerous journalists to the embassy, but none have taken the effort to talk to her, yet. She told us that one of her tasks is to rectify, in a diplomatic manner of course, the skewed image that is being presented.

After the Ambassador's lecture, the audience had numerous questions for her about various topics such as minimum wages, demography, EEA funding, the relationship to Russia, religion, and the Hungarian language.

A very informative evening!

At The Maritime Museum

Sixteen Forum members met Per Norseng at the Maritime Museum on Tuesday, March 12. First we got some of the museum's history.

The Norwegian Maritime Museum was founded in 1914 in connection with the Jubilee Exhibition in Frogner Park, from which the museum received the maritime-related exhibition objects. However, these had to be stored until 1929, when the museum was able to move into new premises at the Norsk Folkemuseum, where it remained until 1960. Then the museum moved to new facilities at Bygdøynes in Oslo. On January 1, 2010, the museum changed its name from Norsk Sjøfartsmuseum (Seafaring Mseum) to Norsk Maritimt (Maritime) Museum.

The main objective of the museum is to be a national institution and disseminate knowledge of Norwegian shipping and activities related to the coast, the sea and the waterways in both a historical and contemporary perspective. Its mission is to explain the importance of shipping and maritime activities for the cultural, social and economic development of Norway. The museum is also responsible for managing and preserving underwater cultural heritage sites along the coast from the Swedish border to Åna-Sira in southwestern Norway.

After our introductory talk, we had a nice tour of this museum. We could have spent days there: so much to see and absorb! The museum really does live up to what it promises.



The boat hall, now an art hall, was fantastic with pictorial maritime art, especially a collection of maritime paintings including works by both unknown and well-known Norwegian artists.

The exhibition *At sea* shows seafarers from the Viking Age to the present: history as it was experienced by those on the decks, the galleries and in the engine room. The interactive *Norway is the Sea* exhibition is a modern display.





The museum changes exhibitions frequently, and hosts various events and lectures throughout the year. The current exhibition *Torpedoed: Norwegian seamen in the war zones during World War 1* was truly fascinating.

The Norwegian Maritime Museum has something for everyone: the children's boat workshop (they can built their own boat); highlights from the museum's collection of traditional Norwegian boats; and not to forget a *boat lab* – a workshop demonstrating traditional Norwegian boat types. This is a museum that the whole family will enjoy!
