# Monday January 11, 2021



Ambassador of Korea, H.E. Young-Sook Nam

Ambassador Dr. Young-Sook Nam is a diplomat, economist, and university professor from the Republic of Korea. Prior to her posting in Norway, Ambassador Nam served as the Secretary General of WeGO (World Smart Sustainable Cities Organization) and is a full professor at the Graduate School of International Studies at Ewha University in Seoul. She is currently on leave to serve her term as Ambassador.

Dr Young-Sook has extensive experience in international and national policy-making institutions, serving as an Economist at the OECD in Paris, Research Economist at the International Labor Office (ILO) in Geneva, and as a Research Fellow at the Korea Institute for International Economic Policy (KIEP).

Ambassador Nam received her M.A. in Economics and a PhD in International Development from Stanford University in the United States. She has published widely on international trade, development cooperation, corporate social responsibility (CSR), smart and sustainable cities, and the Chinese economy.

Corona restrictions permitting, Ambassador of Korea to Norway, H.E. Young-Sook Nam, will talk to us on Korea's experience in combating Covid-19.



#### IMPRESSIONS OF NORWAY

#### **To London With Love**

A curious feature of UK-Norway relations is the Christmas tree diplomacy.

This has its roots in the Second World War, when the Norwegian Royal Family and government escaped to the UK when Norway was invaded and occupied. King Haakon (whose wife Queen Maud was British) lived in the Norwegian Ambassador's Residence in London during the war and led the Norwegian Cabinet from there. British forces fought together with Norwegians in Resistance operations and led the force which liberated most of Norway in 1945. There is some wonderful newsreel footage of King Haakon's return to Oslo aboard the Royal Navy ship HMS Norfolk.

In 1947, the City of Oslo presented a Christmas tree to the British people in thanks, and to brighten up the difficult post-war years. This tradition has continued to brighten up our Christmas every year since. In fact, the tree in Trafalgar Square has become a symbol of Christmas in the UK. Thousands of Londoners see the tree as they pass by the busy square. And hundreds of thousands more visit the tree as part of pre-Christmas shopping trips to London or New Year's Eve celebrations.

The tradition has spread to many other cities, regions and institutions that have particularly close UK-Norway links. For example, the oil city of Stavanger gives a tree to our oil city of Aberdeen. The city of Bergen gives a tree to the city of Newcastle, with which it shared a ferry link. And the Norwegian Foreign Ministry gives a tree to our Foreign Ministry. So, this tradition was born out of shared history, but now celebrates particularly close links between our two countries; links which are constantly reinventing themselves.

Christmas is always a busy time. But I'm glad it is particularly busy for British and Norwegian diplomats, cutting trees, turning on lights and celebrating enduring friendship.

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
