Tove Romsaas Wang, former Director General of Save the Children Norway and a registered nurse, has been a long-time NGO worker. She has a Master in International Health from John Hopkins University in 1982. After a short career at Rikshospitalet and a mission for the UN and WHO in Jemen in the 70s, she became involved in Save the Children Norway as a programme coordinator and later as director of SCN's International Services. Ms Wang became the organisation's on-site representative in Zimbabwe in 1991, then Deputy Secretary General of the International Save the Children before being appointed Secretary General in 2018. She was awarded the King's Medal of Merit in 2019.

She will talk about her work in the service of Save the Children.

The buildings are also home to three museums, Kultur på Hjul ('culture on wheels': cars), the Vespa Museum, and Fornebu Historical Museum.

DIPLOMATIC CHARITY EVENT 2022

To Ukraine with Love

The DCE raised NOK 275 000 to save lives in Ukraine

The year ended on a strong note for International Forum and Oslo's CD Community with a successful Diplomatic Charity Event to raise funds for Ukraine. Over 400 guests attended, and 55 embassies participated. DCE 2022 exceeded all expectations. President of the Norwegian Parliament Masud Gharakhani was the Guest of Honour. He said that 'with the funds raised, the *Ambulance to save lives* can purchase a fully equipped ambulance made in Ukraine. This will not only help those suffering injury due to the war, but also strengthen the local economy and contribute to the maintenance of jobs.'

Stortingspresident Gharakhani spoke movingly about his experience in Ukraine and thanked the organisers of DCE – the Female Ambassadors Oslo, International Forum and Diplomatic Spouses Association of

Norway – for their hard work in organising the event.

At this year's DCE, 43 embassies provided delicious national delicacies and drinks. Exotic food, wine and liqueurs were plentiful in a presentation of amazing variety and abundance. International Forum presented the Norwegian table with fenalår (cured leg of lamb), smoked salmon, Jarlsberg cheese, pepperkake with blue cheese and kransekake.

On December 22, International Forum transferred the donation of NOK 275,000 to Ukrainsk Forening Øst-Norge for the purchase of the ambulance.

The DCE co-organisers had established a selection process to choose the organisation that would receive the proceeds of the charity event. Humanitarian and aid organisations working for Ukraine were invited to submit their projects. Six organisations were shortlisted - Caritas, Norseaid, Norwegian Refugee Council, Norwegian Red Cross, Dråpe i Havet and Ukrainsk Forening Øst-Norge. The chosen mission was Ukrainsk Forening Øst-Norge's project Ambulance to save lives! At the DCE 2022, all six organisations were given an opportunity to present their work at their stands and collect donations for the projects that did not make it to final round this year.

In addition to the remarkable diversity of flavours and choice of food and drink from different lands, DCE 2022 also included an arts and crafts exhibition together with a silent auction, as well as cultural programmes and videos showcasing the talent, technology and tourist destinations of the participating countries.



The raffle prizes were fantastic. There were 52 prizes in all, each prize being a basket of goodies from different countries. Typically, a basket would contain bottles of wine, olive oil, books, cheese, cosmetics, chocolate and exotic spices. IF had several lucky winners. The biggest basket of the evening was won by Turid Grønli.

It included four bottles of wine, two different packets of ham, variety of spices, olives, asparagus, canned bell pepper, glass of almonds, snacks with olive oil, Fallera rice, and

eight boxes of different kinds of cookies and chocolates. Turid commented: 'It was a wonderful event, very well arranged with an important message of hope for Ukraine.' Raffle prizes also included air tickets, artefacts, restaurant and hotel vouchers.



Special Events visit to the Observatory at Solli

On a chilly November day, 27 Forum members and one husband were treated to a guided tour of the Observatory at Solli. We came in two groups, the first at 11:00 and the second at 12:00.



We were greeted by our guide, Anette Braathen, who works in the natural science department at the University of Oslo. We began the tour by a talk in the auditorium. We learnt about Christopher Hansteen (1784 - 1873), a Norwegian geophysicist and astronomer who worked at the University in Copenhagen. He moved to Oslo and wanted to build an observatory. But there was no money for this so he travelled to Siberia to do research on the magnetic poles of the earth. This research earned him status and funding for an observatory.

The building, in Empire

style, was designed by architect Christian Heinrich Grosch (1801 - 1865), together with Christopher Hansteen, to function both as a scientific instrument and living quarters. It was completed in 1833 and is the oldest University building.

The hill at Solli, on which the observatory was built, was ideal for views in all directions. Hansteen moved in with his family and continued his work on magnetism and astronomy. Grosch was the most productive architect at the time, and designed the University, the Stock Exchange and much more.

The guide took us into the scientific wing of the house. We began in the rotunda which is a beautifully decorated circular room, with a gallery and very high ceiling. The main entrance to the building opens into this room, and here guests from the elite – royalty, scientists etc. – were received. Violins would be heard

playing from the gallery. On show were busts of Christopher Hansteen and famous Danish astronomer Tycho Brahe (1546 - 1601), and globes, one showing the world and the other star formations in the sky.

As the city of Oslo expanded over the years, the resulting light pollution made it impossible to use the observatory at Solli so in 1934 it had to close. In 1954, a new solar observatory, constructed at Harestua in the hills north of Oslo, was ready for use. The old Observatory was completely restored in 2011 for the Oslo University's 200-year jubilee. The original colours and designs were then recreated.

From the rotunda we moved into the Meridian room. This room contained an enormous telescope (built on rock), a clock and other instruments. The walls can be opened to the north and south, the ceiling too, and the telescope will point in these directions. Anette opened the walls for us, explaining that the views were very different in 1833. On Lindøya, an island in the Oslofjord, we can still see the cairn on which Hansteen built on a spot exactly south of the observatory, which helped him aim the telescope southwards. He spent 11 years lying on a chair under the telescope, working out the exact position of Christiania (Oslo) on planet earth. He also established the zero-point longitude, the prime meridian, used for measuring time differences around the world.

However, after The International Meridian Conference in Washington in 1884, the observatory at Greenwich, London, took over the prime meridian, and Greenwich Mean Time became established. At the same time, the French obtained approval for use of metric measurements worldwide. Hansteen's work was very important for standardising time and making correct maps, navigations and measurements. He also helped with meteorology.

Then Anette took us up in to the circular dome-shaped room at the very top where there was another telescope. The roof could be opened and rotated, enabling Hansteen to study the sky from all directions. He also studied the sun, and when it was at its highest point, he could tell the people in the city and sailors on the fjord that it was 12:00 - a large orange ball was hoisted at 11:45 and at noon it was lowered. When it was cloudy, he had a very accurate clock to help him. The original mechanism of the room is still functioning, so some of the ladies had a go at turning the roof. Heavy work!

Downstairs Anette took us through the living quarters of the Hansteen family, also beautifully restored. Our tour ended here, and we thanked Annette for her excellent guiding and presented her with a gift of wine. We felt truly privileged to be shown around this wonderful building and learn about Christopher Hansteen's work.


